# Costa Verde District Bylaws Update

CVD bylaws were last updated June 25, 2014. According to Article IX Amendments, the bylaws amendments were provided to Board members January 5, 2025. The Board met on February 3<sup>rd</sup> to discuss the proposed amendments. The Board of Directors approved the revised bylaws and the recommendation that they be presented at the next general meeting.

The next step is to notify the full District membership prior to a general meeting. The bylaw amendments approved by the Board of Directors will be emailed to all Club Presidents by May 9, 2025, and the presidents will forward them to their members. The bylaw amendments will be discussed at the June 9<sup>th</sup> meeting. Following the discussion, there will be a vote to approve or reject.

The current bylaws call for a 2/3 vote of the Board of Directors to approve. The Board of Directors consist of the Executive Committee and the Club Presidents.

The club presidents were provided with the existing bylaws, revised final proposed bylaws, a comparison chart, and the cover letter from Alexis to the Board of Directors. They were notified to forward this to all club members. If you have not received a copy, please contact your club president. Club Presidents are to represent their club and use their judgment in voting to approve or reject the proposed bylaws based on member feedback.
